



EXPLANATORY NOTE

MISSION AND PASTORAL MEASURE 2011 DRAFT PASTORAL (CHURCH BUILDINGS DISPOSAL) SCHEME GLOUCESTER ST STEPHEN DIOCESE OF GLOUCESTER

This note accompanies a draft scheme under the Mission and Pastoral Measure 2011 which makes provision for the future of a closed church building, The Church Commissioners provide this information so that individuals and interested parties can understand the background to the proposals, make a reasoned judgement on the merits of the draft scheme and, if they see fit, a reasoned expression of support or objection to it.

The Current Proposals

The Commissioners have agreed to publish an amending draft Pastoral (Church Buildings Disposal) Scheme providing for the Gloucester Diocese Board of Finance to demolish the closed church of Gloucester St Stephen and dispose of the site for residential and community use and purposes ancillary thereto.

The diocese has been working with an established social housing provider who have developed proposals for temporary and supported accommodation with a Community Hub to assist with local housing and community needs.

Background

St Stephen was declared closed for regular public worship on 1st September 2010 following a decision by the parish to focus its future ministry at the nearby St Paul's church.

A subsequent Pastoral (Church Buildings Disposal) Scheme in 2012 then authorised the Gloucester Diocesan Board of Finance to 'hold' the property for storage use and purposes ancillary thereto. A further Scheme in 2015 then authorised the Board not only to hold, but also to license the property for Christian worship, services, and other religious activities in accordance with the rites and customs of any Christian body designated by the Bishop of Gloucester and for community purposes in addition to the storage use and purposes ancillary thereto. The building was then used by a range of community groups, but this stopped in 2018 due to the deteriorating condition of the building.

Since then, the Board have been considering the future of St Stephen and have now recommended that the unlisted building be demolished to make way for a social housing development with a community hub to help meet local housing needs and serve the community.

The Building

The closed church of St Stephen is located on the eastern side of the Bristol Road in a mixed residential and industrial area on the south-western edge of Gloucester. It is a late Victorian Gothic church built in 1895-9 to designs by G W Planck in the Perpendicular style. It consists of a five-bay aisled nave with west baptistery, two bay chancel with flanking Lady Chapel, and organ chamber and vestries. The church is constructed of brick with limestone dressings and slate roofs. In the mid-1980s part of the interior was separated off to form an area used for community purposes. It is in poor condition. The building is not listed or situated in a conservation area and a proposal for listing was rejected by English Heritage in 2009.

It should be noted that there is no stained glass and, should demolition proceed, the monuments and memorials will be carefully removed and stored until a new home has been identified for them.

The Views of the Statutory Advisory Committee (SAC)

The Commissioners statutory advisors, The Statutory Advisory Committee of the Church Buildings Council (SAC) have indicated that overall, the building is of low to moderate significance and recommend that if demolition proceeds the demolition contract should provide for the maximum degree of architectural salvage so that conservation projects elsewhere might benefit from the availability of scarce materials and architect-designed details.

Planning and Access

Being unlisted and not in a conservation area the demolition of St Stephen does not require planning permission but the proposed redevelopment for residential with a community hub will require planning permission.

Burials and the Churchyard

There are no burials within the building or within the limited curtilage attached to the church.
